

# BECHUANALAND PROTECTORATE.

No. 62 of 1923.

[Promulgated 21st December, 1923.]

## PROCLAMATION

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HIGH COMMISSIONER

Entitled "The Bechuanaland Protectorate Trading with the Enemy (Amendment) Proclamation, 1923."

Whereas by Proclamation No. 88 of 1914 (herein after referred to as "the said Proclamation") it was declared that the Bechuanaland Protectorate Trading with the Enemy Proclamation 1914 should be extended to the war with Turkey:

And whereas by various Proclamations extending and amending the Bechuanaland Protectorate Trading with the Enemy Proclamation, 1914, all persons residing, carrying on business or being in the Bechuanaland Protectorate were prohibited from trading or having commercial intercourse with persons resident or carrying on business within the Dominions of the Sultan of Turkey:

And whereas it is desirable to grant the licence herein after appearing:

Now therefore under and by virtue of the powers in me vested I do hereby declare proclaim and make known as follows:—

1. Licence is hereby given on behalf of His Majesty to all persons or bodies of persons resident, carrying on business, or being in the Bechuanaland Protectorate to trade and have commercial and financial transactions (including the payment or delivery of any sum of money or property, which is or but for the war would have been due or deliverable in respect of a transaction entered into before the outbreak of war), with persons or bodies of persons resident or carrying on business in the territory defined as enemy country in the said Proclamation.

2. This Proclamation may be cited for all purposes as the Bechuanaland Protectorate Trading with the Enemy (Amendment) Proclamation 1923 and shall have force and take effect from the date of its publication in the *Gazette*.
