PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the High Commissioner

Entitled "The Public Roads Proclamation, 1907, Amendment Proclamation, 1924."

Whereas it is expedient to amend the Public Roads Proclamation 1907.

Now therefore under and by virtue of the powers in me vested I do hereby declare, proclaim and make known as follows:--

1. (1) This Proclamation shall be of force and effect within those portions of the Bechuanaland Protectorate (herein after called the said Protectorate) which are known as the farm Panyane or Ramathlabama's Kuil, the farm Hildavale, the farm Crocodile Pools, the farm Forest Hill, the farm Traquair, the Lobatsi Block, the Gaborones Block, the Gaborones Crown Reserve, and the Tati District, excepting such portions thereof as are assigned to or specifically set apart for the occupation of natives.

(2) The High Commissioner may by notice in the *Gazette* from time to time specify other areas within the said Protectorate to which the provisions of this Proclamation shall apply and the said provisions shall apply accordingly within such areas from the date of the respective notices.

2. (1) It shall not be lawful to draw or trail any sledge, timber, or other heavy material upon any public road notified as such by notice of the Resident Commissioner in terms of section one of the Public Roads Proclamation 1907.

(2) Any person contravening the provisions of this Proclamation shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding ten pounds or in default of payment to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding two months.

3. This Proclamation may be cited as the Public Roads Proclamation 1907 Amendment Proclamation 1924, and shall have force and take effect from the date of its publication in the *Gazette*.
