It is hereby notified for general information that His Excellency the High Commissioner has been pleased to approve the subjoined regulations made by the Resident Commissioner of the Bechuanaland Protectorate, in terms of section one of the Dairies and Dairy Produce (Bechuanaland Protectorate) Proclamation, No. 1 of 1929, as amended by Proclamation No. 35 of 1930.

BECHUANALAND PROTECTORATE DAIRIES AND DAIRY PRODUCE ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS.

1. Additional sub-sections to regulation No. 21, published under High Commissioner's Notice No. 135 of 1930:—

Regulation No. 21 (5). Three grades shall be applied to the qualities of cheese intended for export. The designation of such grades shall be—

- First grade.
- Second grade.
- Third grade.

The grading shall be according to the following scale of points:—

Flavour and aroma	50 points,
Quality, including body and texture ...	30 points,
Colour	10 points,
Salting	5 points,
Finish and general appearance	5 points,

and for the purpose of differentiating the grades—

- First grade cheese shall score 90 to 100 points.
- Second grade cheese shall score 80 to 89 points.
- Third grade cheese shall score 70 to 79 points.

Cheese scoring below 70 points may be exported provided that it is clearly marked below grade.

When cheese has been examined and graded, the inspector shall stamp such cheese with a distinctive mark showing the grade.

(6) Cheese intended for export shall be packed in crates or cases which in the opinion of the inspector are suitable and of sufficient strength for the purpose.

2. In terms of regulation No. 21 (4), published under High Commissioner's Notice No. 135 of 1930, the rate of $\frac{1}{4}$ d. (one-eighth of a penny) per pound calculated on the green weight of the cheese less seven per cent. is hereby fixed and shall be payable from the date of that notice, namely the 31st day of October, 1930.
