

BECHUANALAND PROTECTORATE.

HIGH COMMISSIONER'S NOTICE

No. 65 OF 1946.

It is hereby notified for general information that, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Bechuanaland Protectorate Dairies and Dairy Produce Regulations, published under High Commissioner's Notice No. 53 of 1941, the Resident Commissioner, with the approval of the High Commissioner, has—

(a) in terms of regulation 59 (1) of the said regulations imposed the levies mentioned in Schedule A hereto;

(b) in terms of regulations 79, 83, 84, 86 and 87 of the said regulations imposed the prohibitions mentioned in Schedule B hereto.

2. The aforesaid levies and prohibitions shall be deemed to have been operative as from the 1st day of February, 1946.

3. High Commissioner's Notice No. 31 of 1946 is hereby cancelled.

SCHEDULE A.

There is hereby imposed on all—

(a) creamery butter a levy of one twenty-fifth of a penny per pound;

(b) farm dairy butter a levy of one penny per pound;

(c) factory cheese a levy of two and three-tenths pence per pound;

(d) farm cheese a levy of one penny per pound.

SCHEDULE B.

BUTTERFAT AND BUTTER PRICES.

1. No producer of factory cream shall sell any such cream and no butter manufacturer shall purchase any such cream—

(a) otherwise than on the basis of the butterfat contained therein; or

(b) at a price other than two shillings and one penny per pound for first grade butterfat, one shilling and eleven pence per pound for second grade butterfat, and one shilling and nine pence per pound for third grade butterfat contained in such cream.

2. (1) No butter manufacturer shall sell salted creamery butter at a price other than—

(a) two shillings and two pence per pound for first grade butter;

(b) two shillings per pound for second grade butter; or

(c) one shilling and ten pence per pound for third grade butter.

(2) No butter manufacturer shall sell unsalted creamery butter at a price other than—

(a) two shillings and two and one-quarter pence per pound for first grade butter;

(b) two shillings and one-quarter penny per pound for second grade butter; or

(c) one shilling and ten and one-quarter pence per pound for third grade butter.

(3) No person shall sell salted or unsalted creamery butter at a price exceeding—

(a) two shillings and four pence per pound for first grade butter;

(b) two shillings and two pence per pound for second grade butter; or

(c) two shillings per pound for third grade butter;

provided that this section shall not apply to butter manufacturers.

#### CHEESE MILK AND CHEESE PRICES.

3. No producer of cheese milk shall sell any such milk, and no cheese manufacturer shall buy any such milk at a price other than ten and three-quarter pence per gallon if such milk is bought by the gallon or two shillings and five and three-quarter pence per pound butterfat contained therein if such milk is bought on the basis of its butterfat content.

4. No cheese manufacturer or farm cheese maker shall sell cheese—

(a) of the Cheddar type—

(i) in quantities of twelve pounds or more at a time at a price other than one shilling and seven pence per pound for first grade cheese, one shilling and six pence per pound for second grade cheese, or one shilling and four pence per pound for third grade cheese:

Provided that where the quantity of cheese sold is composed of whole uncut cheese weighing less than twelve pounds each, the price shall be one shilling and eight pence per pound for first grade cheese, one shilling and seven pence per pound for second grade cheese, and one shilling and five pence per pound for third grade cheese;

(ii) in quantities of less than twelve pounds at a time at a price exceeding one shilling and ten pence per pound for first grade cheese, one shilling and nine pence per pound for second grade cheese, and one shilling and seven pence per pound for third grade cheese;

(b) of the Gouda type—

(i) in quantities of twelve pounds or more at a time at a price other than one shilling and seven pence per pound for first grade cheese and at a price below one shilling and three pence or above one shilling and seven pence per pound for ungraded cheese:

Provided that where the quantity of cheese sold is composed of whole uncut first grade cheese weighing not more than five pounds each, the price shall be one shilling and eight pence per pound; and provided further that where the quantity of cheese sold is composed of whole uncut, ungraded cheese weighing not more than five pounds each, the price may be more than as stated herein but shall not exceed one shilling and eight pence per pound for such cheese;

(ii) in quantities of less than twelve pounds at a time at a price exceeding one shilling and nine pence per pound for such cheese.

5. (1) No person shall sell cheese—

(a) of the Cheddar type at a price exceeding one shilling and ten pence per pound for first grade cheese, one shilling and nine pence per pound for second grade cheese and one shilling and seven pence per pound for third grade cheese:

Provided that a whole uncut cheese weighing less than twelve pounds may be sold at a price not exceeding one shilling and eleven pence per pound for first grade cheese, one shilling and ten pence per pound for second grade cheese, or one shilling and eight pence per pound for third grade cheese;

(b) of the Gouda type at a price exceeding one shilling and ten pence per pound; provided that a whole uncut cheese weighing not more than five pounds may be sold at a price not exceeding one shilling and eleven pence per pound.

(2) The provisions of this section shall not apply to cheese manufacturers or farm cheese makers.
