PROCLAMATION

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HIGH COMMISSIONER
Entitled the Swaziland Criminal Procedure and
Evidence (Amendment) Proclamation, 1947.

Whereas it is expedient to amend the Swaziland Criminal Procedure and Evidence Proclamation, 1938, hereinafter referred to as "the principal law";

Now therefore under and by virtue of the powers, authorities and jurisdiction conferred upon and committed to me by His Majesty under the Swaziland Order in Council, 1903, as amended by the Swaziland Order in Council, 1906, and the Swaziland Order in Council, 1909, I do hereby declare, proclaim and make known as follows:—

1. The following section, numbered *one hundred and seventy-seven A*, is hereby inserted immediately after section *one hundred and seventy-seven* of the principal law:—

"Attempts, incitements, etc., to commit offences. 177A. (1) Any person who attempts to commit any offence against a statute or a statutory regulation shall be guilty of an offence and, if no punishment is expressly provided thereby for such an attempt, be liable on conviction to the punishment to which a person convicted of actually committing that offence would be liable.

(2) Any person who—

(a) conspires with any other person to aid or procure the commission of or to commit; or

(b) incites, instigates, commands or procures any other person to commit,

any crime or offence, whether at common law or against a statute or statutory regulation, shall be guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to the punishment to which a person convicted of actually committing that crime or offence would be liable."

Short title. 2. This Proclamation may be cited as the
Swaziland Criminal Procedure and Evidence
(Amendment) Proclamation, 1947.
