

BECHUANALAND PROTECTORATE.

HIGH COMMISSIONER'S NOTICE

No. 237 OF 1949.

It is hereby notified for general information that, under and by virtue of the powers vested in him by section *fifty-four* of the Bechuanaland Protectorate Motor Vehicle and Road Traffic Proclamation, 1947 (No. 23 of 1947), His Excellency the High Commissioner has been pleased to make the following additional regulation:—

“ 31. (1) Where, by virtue of the powers vested in a local authority under section *thirty-two*, any local authority causes a stop sign to be erected in any street, such stop sign shall be erected on the left hand side of the street, facing the oncoming traffic and within six feet from the edge of the street or kerbline and at least three feet above street level showing the word “STOP” in five inch black letters on a yellow background twenty-four inches in length and eight inches in width. The legend shall be illuminated by reflectors. Where the road surface is constructed of tar macadam or material other than earth or gravel a white line at least four inches in width shall in addition to the stop sign be painted halfway across the street running transversely to the lateral line of the street from the stop sign.

(2) Any person who fails to comply with the direction of any stop sign shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.”
