THE NURSES AND MIDWIVES LAW, 1964

THE NURSING COUNCIL FOR BOTSWANA (BADGE) RULES, 1969

(Published on 23rd May, 1969)

In accordance with section 12(2) of the Nurses and Midwives' Law, 1964 (No. 43 of 1964), the following rules, made by the Nursing Council for Botswana in the exercise of the powers vested in it by section 12(1) (k) of the said Law and approved by the Minister of Education, Health and Labour, are published —

Citation

1. These rules may be cited as the Nursing Council for Botswana (Badge) Rules, 1969

Interpretation

2. In these rules —

“badge” means a badge such as is described in rule 3;

“register” means the register of nurses or the register of midwives kept in terms of section 13 (a) of the Law.

Badge for Registered Nurses and Midwives

3. There shall be a badge for registered nurses and registered midwives which shall show the National Flag of Botswana in colour on gilt circled with a black border bearing in gilt the words “Nursing Council for Botswana”.

Sale of Badge by Council

4. The badge shall be sold by the Council to registered nurses and registered midwives for a price of 60 cents.

Registered Number to be engraved on Badge

5. Before a badge is delivered to a person to whom it is sold there shall be engraved on the back thereof the number under which such person is entered in the register, and should such person be registered both as a nurse and as a midwife, both the numbers under which she is entered shall be so engraved.

Manner of wearing Badge

6. The badge shall be worn only when the person wearing it is in uniform and shall be worn pinned to the right upper front of the uniform.

Loss of Badge to be Notified

7. In the event of a badge being lost, its owner shall notify the Council of the loss.

Restriction on Manufacture, Sale and Supply of Badges

8. The badge shall not be manufactured, sold or supplied by any person other than a person approved of for that purpose by the Council.

Offences

9. (1) Any person who contravenes rules 6 or 7 shall be guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to a fine of fifty rand.

(2) Any person who contravenes rule 8 shall be guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to a fine of fifty rand or three months imprisonment, or to both such fine and imprisonment.
