## PROCLAMATION

By HIS EXCELLENCY THE HIGH COMMISSIONER

Entitled the Bechuanaland Protectorate Customs Management  
Amendment Proclamation, 1920.

Whereas it is expedient to amend in certain respects the Bechuanaland Protectorate Customs Management Proclamation 1914 (herein after referred to as "the said Proclamation");

Now therefore under and by virtue of the powers in me vested I do hereby declare, proclaim and make known as follows:—

1. If the driver or person in charge of a vehicle as defined in the said Proclamation when entering, leaving or within any railway station or any other defined area in which there is a customs office fails, when requested by an officer of customs by word, sign or in any other way, to cause the vehicle to stop or, when the vehicle is stationary, causes it to be set in motion until such officer has been able to question any person in the vehicle as to the presence therein of dutiable articles or articles the importation or exportation of which is prohibited or restricted or has been able to search the vehicle for such articles, such driver or person in charge shall be deemed to have obstructed the officer in the carrying out of his duties within the meaning of section *five* of the said Proclamation and shall be liable on conviction to the penalty in that section provided.

2. This Proclamation which may be cited as the Bechuanaland Protectorate Customs Management Amendment Proclamation, 1920, shall be read as one with the said Proclamation and shall have force and take effect from the date of its publication in the *Gazette*.
