

PROCLAMATION.¹

HIS EXCELLENCY SIR HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, &c., &c.

DATED 27th SEPTEMBER, 1892.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make certain alterations in the titles, and more clearly to define the jurisdictions of the Resident Commissioner for Bechuanaland and the Tati District, the Assistant Commissioner and Magistrate for Bechuanaland, and the Magistrate for Bechuanaland and the Tati District, and better to define the local limits for the operation of laws, now or hereafter in force in the Bechuanaland Protectorate:

Now, therefore, under and by virtue of the powers, authorities and jurisdiction conferred upon and committed to me by Her Majesty, I do hereby proclaim, declare, and make known as follows:—

Repeal of inconsistent laws.

1. So much of my Proclamations, dated the 27th day of June, 1891, and the 4th day of September, 1891, and of any other Proclamation Ordinance, or Law as may be repugnant to or inconsistent with the provisions of this Proclamation, shall be and is hereby repealed.

Limits of the Bechuanaland Protectorate.

3. The jurisdictions and authorities of the Resident Commissioner and every Assistant Commissioner for the Bechuanaland Protectorate and the Territories adjacent thereto, shall be exercised throughout the following Territories and Districts:—²

- (a) The Territories lying between the Crown Colony of British Bechuanaland, the 22nd parallel of the South Latitude and Macloutsie River.
- (b) The Territory known as the disputed Territory lying between the Shashi and Macloutsie Rivers, excepting the area included in the Tuli District.
- (c) The Tati District.
- (d) Such Territories north of the 22nd parallel of South Latitude as belong to the Chief Khama of the Bamangwato.
- (e) Such Territories lying to the north and the west of the Territories of the Chief Khama as do not belong to the Chief Lobengula.
